

Cody Enterprise Q&A from Bryan Miller - 3 Aug 2020

What about your past has prepared you for this position?

I'm a God-Fearing Family Man, Life-long Wyoming Republican, Staunch Conservative, Champion of the Constitution, and Defender of Liberty. I'm a small business owner, retired Air Force Officer and Pilot, serving in Combat, Combat Support, and Disaster Relief Operations worldwide. I have national and international experience in government, civil, and military matters and have a deep understanding of Wyoming's legislative and executive branches from years of engagement as a citizen, small business owner, and Republican Party member. Finally, with all the turmoil in our nation today, the courage to lead is more urgently needed than ever. I am the only candidate for U.S. Senate with the breadth of experience, the leadership skills honed during my nearly 23 years in the military, the tenacity, and the guts to stand my ground in the Washington Swamp and defend the rights of Wyoming's people as I boldly lead Wyoming into the future.

Recent events have shown the fragility of Wyoming's energy economy? How would you work to safeguard the Wyoming economy for the future?

First, clear the way to get businesses open and our kids back in school; this will restart the U.S. economy and thus the world economy. Both of which will grow the need for and use of energy sources that we in Wyoming can and do provide. Second, clear the way for businesses who have moved overseas to come home. That way we can re-diversify our economy, secure our nation's health system supply, food supply, and defense lines of production, all which will help put Wyoming's citizens back to work. The diversification of coal use across energy production, carbon fiber production (we buy most of this from China now), 3-D Printing resins (Wyoming businesses are already courting RAMACO in Sheridan for this product) will ultimately stabilize prices. And third, use the Commerce Clause to eliminate barriers that block Wyoming coal from being transported to the coast for sale to Asian nations.

If elected, what is the top policy you would work to enact?

Policies regarding Growth of the Economy, Reducing our National Debt, Ensuring National Security requirements while preserving our Liberty under the 4th Amendment, Enhancing engagement in the Veterans Administration, Access to Healthcare, Protecting Social Security, Enforcing Immigration Laws, and Securing

our Liberty are all top issues that need to be addressed, some more immediately, and the others over the next several years. Bottomline, there are too many tops to cover in detail in 150 words, so I'll address a little philosophy here. I fully understand the Constitutional roles of a United States Senator and will work to restore their core oversight duties. Right now, the Senate acts as a mirror image of the US House of Representatives. This is a waste of resources when oversight is needed on the spending habits of the House, on International Treaties and Agreements, and in ensuring that originalist judges are appointed to the federal courts.

What do you see as the biggest issue facing the country right now? In 3 years?

Federal Overreach. This topic encompasses impacts on Wyoming's energy, agriculture, and tourism industries, the three largest industries contributing to our economy, jobs, and family life. Two specific ways that I intend to address overreach include: 1) Redesigning the rule-making process to stop unelected, unaccountable, bureaucrats from writing rules that effectively become law without congressional review, many of which target Wyoming's resources; 2) Ending the litigation agenda that plagues mining, transmission, water, and other major land and infrastructure developments by those who weaponize the Environmental Protection Agency.
